
Welcome to St. Michael Catholic Church

XXX SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME ENCOUNTERING GOD

The readings for this Sunday help us to reflect on encountering God. The three readings narrate three distinct encounters, in distinct

times, but they all make us think about the relationship between us and God.

In the first reading, the prophet Jeremiah motivates the people after the captivity of Babylonia and invites them to rejoice. He encourages them by reminding them that God is their father, that he will guide them and bring them to Jerusalem on a level road so that none shall stumble: "The LORD has delivered his people, the remnant of Israel... For I am a father to Israel, Ephraim is my first-born." (Jer 31:7b.9b) It is also good to remember the Responsorial Psalm from today, it is the Canticle of the pilgrims, who after being freed from so much suffering, walk joyfully toward Jerusalem filled with laughter and rejoicing: "The LORD has done great things for us; we are filled with joy." (Ps 126: 3)

The second reading from the letter to the Hebrews makes us reflect on an encounter which is much more intimate and personal, and many times forgotten and sometimes feared, the encounter with the Father through the Sacrament of Penance. In the confessional we obtain the pardon of sins by the priestly ministry of men, priests who are still human, and so are "able to deal patiently with the ignorant and erring, for he himself is beset by weakness." (Heb 5:2)


I want to take a moment to reflect on the priesthood, which is a privilege because is a gift from God. Since its origins it is a ministry with a very specific mission and task: the reason it exists is to establish a relationship between God and men, between the invisible and the visible, between holiness and weakness, in a word to be a bridge between God and men. Today we priests need to turn our eyes to this thought from the letter to the Hebrews, to recuperate and live out faithfully our vocation: commitment, mission and service. But I ask all of you, my brothers and sisters, for your prayers for each one of us priests that we can continue in our vocation.

Today's gospel centers on the miracle that

Jesus performed on his way to Jerusalem, returning sight to a blind man. "'What do you want me to do for you?' The blind man replied to him, 'Master, I want to see.' Jesus told him, 'Go your way; your faith has saved you.' Immediately he received his sight and followed him on the way." (Mk 10:51-52) This gospel passage is not limited to only a commentary on the healing action of Jesus, rather it goes further by showing him the way to follow. Most eye diseases at that time had little hope of a cure, and so the destiny of the patients was very difficult. Generally the only thing they could do was beg which would only add to their internal anguish because of their situation. That is why in those days blind people represented misery and human desperation. In the Gospel we hear about the encounter of a poor, marginalized man (Bartimaeus) who identifies with Jesus of Nazareth, and when he is freed he commits himself to Jesus' liberating project.

These readings should help us to reflect on and question our relationship with God in such a way that it drives us to draw closer and closer to God, because remember by brothers and sisters that "God has done great things for us" and we should rejoice.



Amendment Two - putting students first

Within our Catholic Faith we are called to reflect on the teachings of the Gospel, live out the Beatitudes and embody Christ's compassion. Our Catholic Church supports numerous initiatives to protect the vulnerable and lift the marginalized, expand access to health care, and to protect and respect the dignity of every human person.

The teaching is clear that empowering families to make educational choices for their children is also a matter of justice.

The Church teaches that parents are the primary educators of their children. The state has an important role to play in supporting families in fulfilling that responsibility, as Pope St. Paul VI said, "true liberty in their choice of schools."

Kentucky already funds private and nonprofit organizations for essential services like child welfare and medical care, using proven programs to deliver results. Extending this approach to education will foster healthy competition where the ultimate winners are the students themselves—because a child's education can shape their entire future. This election you will see a constitutional amendment on the ballot, giving Kentuckians the opportunity to weigh-in on much-needed changes. By striking language from the state's constitution that dates to the 1800s, it would allow legislators to explore more options for funding education initiatives in addition to and outside of our traditional public schools. Nationally, this will help Kentucky compete with neighboring states that have already embraced educational choice in various forms. It will ensure that, regardless of economic status, every student has the opportunity to attend a school that best fits their needs. Any specific policies resulting from this amendment would still need to pass through the legislative process with careful research, debate, and voting. We firmly believe that voting 'yes' means putting students first.
