-Providing our children a strong Catholic upbringing.


-Giving comfort to those in need.


Mass Intentions Available

3rd SUNDAY OF LENT CONVERTION TO BE WITNESSES OF HOPE

We are already in the third Sunday of Lent and we are presented with a strong call to conversion as we look toward celebrating Easter. Easter is the most

important faith event for every believer.

In the first reading we hear: "I have witnessed the affliction of my people in Egypt and have heard their cry of complaint against their slave drivers, so I know well what they are suffering. Therefore I have come down to rescue them from the hands of the Egyptians and lead them out of that land into a good and spacious land, a land flowing with milk and honey." (Ex 3:7-8) One of the first elements is the vocation of Moses as the one sent by God to free his people from slavery in Egypt. God has chosen and prepared the one he sent. God makes himself present in the history of humanity sharing in a way the suffering of his people. Even today, God continues to protect and liberate his people. Pope Francis in his Bull of Indiction of the Jubilee 2025 "Spes Non Confundit" (Hope does not disappoint) in paragraph 13th affirms: "Signs of hope should also be present for migrants who leave their homelands behind in search of a better life for themselves and for their families. Their expectations must not be frustrated by prejudice and rejection. A spirit of welcome, which embraces everyone with respect for his or her dignity, should be accompanied by a sense of responsibility, lest anyone be denied the right to a dignified existence"

"The gardener said to him in reply, 'Sir, leave it for this year also, and I shall cultivate the ground around it and fertilize it; it may bear fruit in the future. If not you can cut it down'" (Lk 13: 8-9). We are challenged as Christians to live our faith in order to bear fruit. It is Pope Francis in his Bull of Indiction of Jubilee, "Hope does not disappoint" who tells us in paragraph 13b: "May the Christian community always be prepared to defend the rights of those who are most vulnerable, opening wide its doors to welcome them, lest anyone ever be robbed of the hope of a better future. May the Lord's words in the great parable of the Last Judgement always find an echo in our hearts: "I was a stranger and you welcomed me" for "just as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers and sisters, you did it to me" (Mt 25:35.40)."

Pope continuing saying in the paragraph #15: "I ask with all my heart that hope be granted to the billions of the poor, who often lack the essentials of life. Before the constant tide of new forms of impoverishment, we can easily grow inured and resigned. Yet we must not close our eyes to the dramatic situations that we now encounter all around us, not only in certain parts of the world. Each day we meet people who are poor or impoverished; they may even be our next-door neighbors. Often they are homeless or lack sufficient food for the day. They suffer from exclusion and indifference on the part of many"

I conclude with the end of the indiction bull of jubilee from Pope Francis: "Let us even now be drawn to this hope! Through our witness, may hope spread to all those who anxiously seek it. May the way we live our lives say to them in so many words: 'Hope in the Lord! Hold firm, take heart and hope in the Lord!' (Ps 27:14). May the power of hope fill our days, as we await with confidence the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ, to whom be praise and glory, now and forever." Amen.

A PLENARY INDULGENCE

is a Catholic Church gift that forgives the temporal punishment for sins that have already been forgiven. The word "plenary" means "full".

How to obtain a plenary indulgence Be in the state of grace, Confess sins sacramentally, Receive Holy Communion, Pray for the intentions of the Holy Father, and Have a complete detachment from sin.

Benefits of a plenary indulgence Strengthens the bond with the Church, Encourages repentance and conversion, Emphasizes God's mercy, and Allows believers to grow in holiness and spiritual freedom.

When can I obtain a plenary indulgence?

• During Lent, you can obtain a plenary indulgence by praying the Stations of the Cross, meditating on the rosary, or spending time at eucharistic adoration You can also obtain a plenary indulgence by going to confession, receiving Communion, and praying for the pope

Types of indulgences

There are two types of indulgences: plenary and partial. A partial indulgence only partially frees from the punishment due for sins.
